Keynote Speaker

Reverend Dr. Herbert H. Lusk, II Pastor,

Greater Exodus Baptist Church Philadelphia, PA

Highly sought after by diverse audiences, Reverend Lusk travels the country delivering engaging, poignant and forthright opinion on faith-based and community issues. At the height of his successful National Football League playing career with the Philadelphia Eagles, he left the NFL to lead a life of ministry. Pastor Lusk was known as the "praying tailback" for celebrating touchdowns on one knee in prayer. He is documented in the NFL history books as the first player to do so.

A leader of people and communities, Pastor Lusk founded the non-profit, People For People, Inc. ("PFP"), which continues to transform lives through its holistic programming: PFP Early Childhood Development Center, PFP Charter School, PFP Institute, Project D.A.D., HOPE Pregnancy Center, and Stand for Africa. In addition, Pastor Lusk founded G.E. Ministries, which oversees the Frederick Douglass Christian School and the Grace Dental Clinic in Chester, PA.

Pastor Lusk has served as advisor to two United States presidents on Faith-Based Initiatives and was appointed to the Presidential Advisory Council on HIV & AIDS. He shared a speaking platform with Pope Francis before an international audience of 89 million people and appeared on national broadcast programs, including Nightline, Hardball, and Fox News. His work has garnered numerous awards, honors, and citations.

Pastor Lusk currently serves as the lead chaplain for the Super Bowl Champion Philadelphia Eagles. He holds a B.S. in Psychology and Sociology, a Masters of Divinity, and three honorary doctorate degrees.

Pastor Lusk is married and the proud father of a son, two daughters, two sons-in-law, and three grandsons.

Rev. Lusk has agreed to be the speaker for the 2021 Community Prayer Breakfast.



ORION offers hope for individuals and families experiencing hardship due to poverty, disability or illness by building bridges that lead to self-reliance.



The Social Concerns Committee of the Phoenixville Interfaith Council, predecessor of the Phoenixville Area Social Concerns Committee, created a special annual award in 1999. Humanitarian Award recipients have lived or worked in the greater Phoenixville Community for at least 5 years and demonstrate dedication and lasting service in the areas of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion. They heavily engage in voluntary service to affect positive change in the community.

Awardees raise the community's awareness of social justice, develop creative solutions to social concerns, and advocate for a future defined by wellbeing for all.

Humanitarian Award recipients live these Golden Rules:

"In everything do to others as you would have them do to you."

"Love your neighbor as yourself."
"It is better to give than to receive."

These words of exhortation honor the quality of life dreamed for by Reverend King which the Phoenixville Area Social Concerns Committee honors in turn.

The award is named in remembrance of life-long Phoenixville resident and activist Emma Laura (McDermott) Valenteen who was well known in the community for the charitable work done through her *The Compassionate Friends* network. Mrs. Valenteen died in 2010.

Awardees embody the compassionate life and work of Emma Valenteen herself, including:

- A desire to elevate the level of cooperative living among Phoenixville Area residents;
- The positive impact of their compassionate actions on the Phoenixville Community;
- A history of volunteer involvement in the greater Phoenixville community;
- The demonstration of inner strength through overcoming personal misfortune;
- Turning misfortune into an empathetic, positive force to impact quality of living in the community and the well-being of its residents, and;
- Being viewed as a positive role model by many members in the community.






